THE FINE WW2 'BILDA'S BOMBERS' 1943 D.F.C. TO A WELLINGTON BOMBER NAVIGATOR WHO AFTER FLYING NUMEROUS SORTIES AGAINST TARGETS IN GERMANY WITH 142 SQUADRON, HIS CREW FORMED PART OF A SCRATCH UNIT HASTILY FORMED TO TAKE PART IN THE NORTH AFRICAN CAMPAIGN, 1942-3

D.F.C. London Gazette 30 March 1943. The original recommendation, dated 31 January 1943:

"This Officer has consistently displayed fine navigational skill and eagerness to take part in operations against the enemy. These qualities have contributed to the success of his crew in obtaining photographs of the target area. At all times on the ground and in the air his fine example, skill and devotion to duty have been an inspiration to all other navigators of the squadron."

Additionally, the Commanding Officer of 142 Squadron added:

"P/O May has operated with No.142 Squadron for the past five months, during which he has carried out 24 successful sorties. His fine offensive spirit and outstanding navigational skills have largely contributed to giving his crew the highest record in the squadron for photographs of the target area. At all times on the ground and in the air his fine example, skill and devotion to duty have been an inspiration to the other navigators in the squadron. Very Strongly recommended for the Award of the Distinguished Flying Cross."

## FLIGHT LIEUTENANT JOHN MAY (134655) ROYAL AIR FORCE VOLUNTEER RESERVE

John May, from Penwortham, Preston was born circa 1912 and pre war worked for Leyland and Birmingham Rubber Co. He had been married in 1936 and enlisted into Royal Air Force within months of the outbreak of the war. Initially a Sergeant Observer (No 1101598) as part of W/O Bray's crew, they joined 142 Squadron on 17 August 1942. At this time, the Squadron was based at RAF Grimsby, equipped with Vickers Wellington III and IV's

Serving as Navigator, May's first operational sortie as part of W/O Bray's crew, was against Saarbrucken on 1 September 1942 and he would take part in a further 7 sorties that month, including many to highly defended targets in Germany including Karlsrhe, Breman (twice), Dusseldorf and Essen. Over the next couple of months, he would take part in a further 9 sorties to Krefeld, Aachen, Osnabruck, Koln, Milan, Stuttgart, as well as several 'Gardening' ops

Having been commissioned Pilot Officer on 23 October 1942, on 9 December 1942, Bray (now Commissioned and DFC) and crew were one a detachment of 13 Wellington's from 142 Squadron to fly to the Middle East, to take part in the North African campaign. These aircraft from 142 Squadron, along with a similar number taken from 150 Squadron, amounting not more than 350 air and groundcrew (less than a squadron strength), formed a scratch night bomber unit, put together at extremely short notice. This due to the rapid movements of the campaign in Tunisia at that time. Here they would be based at Bilda airfield and would prove their worth over the coming months. Note the title of the 1943 book in this group 'Bilda's Bombers' which details their service.

Their first operational sortie was on Bizerte Docks on 1 January 1943, this being a target (along with Bizerte town) they would return to no less than 9 times over the following 7 weeks. Bizerte, a port city in Tunisia, was a key location within the Tunisian campaign where Allied forces began their push against Axis forces, ultimately leading to the capture of the city and the surrender of Axis troops in

May 1943. Other Targets May took part in sorties to during January and February 1943, included, Sidi Ahmed Aerodrome, Medenine Aerodrome, Almas Aerodrome in Sardinia, Villaeido Landing Ground and Trapani.

Flight Lieutenant May's last operational sortie with 142 Squadron was on 15 February 1943, a bombing sortie to Birzerte. During this sortie and enemy fighter was damaged by the rear gunner. The Bray crew, including May, left for Algeria, enroute to England on 23 March 1943. By this time, he had completed 31 Operational sorties, 17 over Northwest Europe and 14 over North Africa





Though there is no logbook with the group, all off May's 31 operational sorties have been extracted from these to form a 5 page list, each entry detailing aircraft number, crew list and aircraft report in brief. Examples below:



It seems Flying Officer May was an extremely fine navigator and post 142 squadron served as an instructor. On 16 August 1944 he is noted to have visited no 33 Service Flying Training School, Mantioba, Canada:

"F/O. J. May (134655) G.D. Nav., and P/O. F.V. Hill (173447) G.D. Nav., Manitoba. Navigation Instructors from United Kingdom on tour in Canada arrived by air for a two day liaison visit"

It is unlikely that Flying Officer May saw any further operational service during the war but this is certainly worthy of further research.

- 6) Four RAF buttons, two DFC ribbon bars, an epaulette rank bar and May's dog tag
- 7) 42 Air School Christmas 1941 menu

- 10) RAF yellow canvas escape packet
